Field Agent's Corner: Top 10 Facts to Know About Long-Term Care Planning

November is National Long-Term Care Awareness Month, an event recognized by Congress and several States. To mark the occasion, here are 10 interesting facts shared by the American Association for Long-Term Care Insurance.

- # 1 Americans are living longer, in large part due to advances in medical care and public health. Life expectancy in the US for those reaching 65 was 20 years on average in 2019.
- # 2 By 2030, one in five residents in the US will be 65 or older.
- # 3 The number of people in need of long term support services (LTSS) in the United States is already at 14 million and expected to grow to 27 million by 2050.
- # 4 Average out-of-pocket costs are \$140,000 for those individuals who utilize paid long term support services (LTSS). Roughly 17 percent will spend over \$100,000 on LTSS. Almost 9 percent will spend over \$250,000 on LTSS.

- # 5 By 2040, the total prevalence of Alzheimer's disease and related dementias in the US is expected to approximately double from 7.2 million to nearly 13 million, with 8.5 million women and 4.5 million men expected to develop dementia.
- # 6 For those requiring high levels of LTSS, individuals and families pay 55 percent of long-term care costs out of pocket.
- # 7 Currently, the majority of older single-person households are female. Women comprised 74 percent of solo households aged 80 and over.
- # 8 Some 7.5 million Americans have some form of long[1]term care insurance. Two-thirds of all new individual long[1]term care insurance claims pay for care needed by women.
- # 9 The long-term care insurance industry paid out \$11 billion in benefits to some 310,000 individuals with insurance protection in 2019. The number will increase each year as the current number of policyholders grow older and, as a result, are more likely to begin their claim.
- # 10 69.5 percent of new claims start after the policyholder reaches age 80. If you live a long life, you are very likely to need long term care. You'll be very glad you have a policy to pay benefits.

The sixth picture shows the ladies disassembling the tables.


The last picture shows the food prepared/purchased by Peggy and enjoyed by all after the completion of the job.

KNIGHTS IN ACTION - Knights assist Diocesan Youth Group Function

The youth and adult volunteers at the Camp Timpoochee, Niceville, Florida number about 225 hungry mouths to feed.

Brother Reggie Brown (our youth coordinator at OLV) requested help on April 6 (Sat) and April 7 (Sun). Cooks were needed for breakfast and lunch on Saturday (April 6) and then to cook breakfast on Sunday (April 7) for about two hundred diocesan youth. Foods (supplies) cost were reimbursed; we just needed to help with its preparation. The camp has a full kitchen, with all equipment for this event. Location is at Camp Timpoochee (off Hwy 20), next to Walton County line. Our Grand Knight, Tony Alcobia, with help from his wife, Florina, shopped at Sam's and transported a full truckload of food and supplies.

Tony thinks that after he ran that operation, the next year it was done by Russ Giambrone and then Travis Robinson every year after that. Russ Giambrone now lives in south Florida. During this nine-year period, there were two years the event was cancelled due to a storm, so the event was moved from March/April to November. Two more years were cancelled due to COVID 19.

Now back to 15/16 Oct 2022...

Once again Council 7968 was asked to support the Timpoochee Diocesan Youth Group function held on 15/16 Oct 2022. On Thursday 13 Oct, Brother Travis and his wife Jeanine along with Brother Tony Jette and his wife Rosemary purchased \$1000 worth of food for the two-day Timpoochee operation that was paid for by our Catholic Diocese. The food purchased was enough to feed 120 hungry young people lunch and dinner on Saturday and breakfast on Sunday. The cost per person was a little over \$10 for the three meals, which was very reasonable. As in previous years, the diocese purchased t-shirts which were passed out to the youth and helpers. The group function is a lot of work but was enjoyed by all who participated.

BINGO WORKERS NEEDED!

As you all know, Tuesday night bingo is our main means of financial support. We have three bingo teams that work three hours every third week from 6:15 to 9:15 PM. At one time we had four teams, but due to work shift changes, deaths and family moves we lost a team. To help improve the situation, it would be wonderful if we could get a fourth team again. So, I am asking for volunteers to help get a fourth team up and running so everyone will only have to work once every four weeks, which would be super. This is what we would need: Two men to verify winners, two callers (one from 6:30 to 8 PM and one from 8 to 9:15 PM), one bingo card seller and one cook that would work in the kitchen from 3:30 to 7 PM, with training in the kitchen as needed.

We also have Quarter Bingo that runs from 4:30 to 6:15 PM. Currently we have two bingo callers that work every other week and two fellows, one 85 and the other 88 that work Quarter Bingo every Tuesday night collecting money for each bingo game, recording the results of each game and verifying and paying the winners. We also have three Knights who work once every three weeks from 3:15 to 9:15 PM selling bingo tickets during Quarter and Regular Bingo sessions. It would be wonderful if we could get help in this area so that we could have one knight selling tickets from 3:15 to 6:15 PM and a second Knight selling tickets and paying winners from 6:15 to 9:15 PM. We definitely need help in this area!

During bingo every week we need three women to work in the kitchen taking food orders, delivering the meals to the bingo players and a French fry/onion ring preparer. We usually have the same three women working in the kitchen every week and it would be wonderful if we could get more women so weekly women teams could be established. So it would be appreciated fellows if you would pass this on to your wives.

Training will be provided.
